I kept my movements and actions consistent so he could adapt to the house. I watch him "count his steps" from the family room to the kitchen until he finds his way to the back door. There are several steps down, and, as he has learned what steps are, he is able to run up and down

with my other dogs. Our back yard is large. Once again he learned where all the bushes and trees are, so he moves freely without hitting any of them.



When Charlie first came into our lives, one of my cats would stare at him. I watched him one night reach out to touch Charlie's eyes.

He knew they looked different, but he realized they're the same as his! There is no pity or feeling sorry for him, just acceptance. The love and joy we have in our lives because of Charlie is an experience I would recommend to everyone. —Pam Godsell 🐾
